

What is the Spring Equinox?

The Spring Equinox is a solar festival which is celebrated when the Sun crosses the path of the equator line and heads in a Northerly direction. It is the point which is used to mark the astronomical start of Spring in the Northern part of the world and brings with it longer hours of daylight and the return of warmer temperatures. It is also known as the vernal equinox.

Fun facts! On the Equinoxes, the day and night are nearly of equal length! It is also the only time where the sun rises in the exact East and sets in the exact West for everyone on the planet apart from at the North and South Poles!




Why is the Spring Equinox celebrated?

The Spring Equinox celebrates a time for new beginnings, new life and growth. As the tiny green shoots of life begin to spring from the cold dark earth and the sun's rays begin to strengthen we are grateful that the long winter months are drawing to an end. Every Pagan path has it's own special

name for this festival and rituals which may be done around this time, examples of these names are Eostre, Ostara and Alban Eilir to name a few.




Spring Equinox Deities:

Depending on your personal Pagan path, you may have a Deity associated with Spring Equinox. One Deity associated with this festival is Ēostre a Germanic Goddess who represents the beginning of Spring, and the new potentials and new beginnings it brings after the darkness of winter. Other Deities such as Freya from the Norse Pantheon, Semiramis from the Babylonian Pantheon and Cybele from the Roman Pantheon are also associated with this festival and are honoured in their own special way.

The Spring Equinox

The Spring Equinox is also associated with certain plants and trees such as daffodils, violets, primroses and the birch tree to name just a few. These begin to carpet the ground, bringing bright colours such as green, yellow and purple after the winter and fresh buds start to grow on the trees with them can bring a feeling of joy and happiness.



Did you know?

Birch is the first tree to begin to come into leaf at this time of year?



Out and about activity:

Grab your boots, get your coat and head outside! Take a slow walk around your neighbourhood and see if you can spot any flowers and plants emerging from their sleep. Maybe create a seasonal journal where you can record the plants which you see along your route, perhaps find a birch tree and do some bark rubbing, see if you can spot it's beautiful bright green leaves beginning to emerge.

<u>Creatures associated with Spring</u> Equinox:

New life begins at this time of year as the creatures emerge from the long winter and begin to build nests or give birth, there are creatures associated with the Spring Equinox such as hares, rabbits, chicks and lambs to name just a few!





Did you know:

Lots of birds begin emerge at this time, many are looking to find safe places to start nesting and you may see them starting to look for nesting material such as twigs, moss and leaves. Birds can be very symbolic within Paganism and on your own personal Pagan path you may discover the spiritual importance of our feathered friends!

Activity:

This is a lovely opportunity to see which feathered friends you have in your garden and your local area. We have created a bird watching sheet it will help you record which birds you spot on your travels and can be found at the end of this information booklet. You may wish to undertake this at different times of the year and compare your results. By doing this, you are creating a wonderful connection, understanding and deep appreciation for Mother Earth and how the world around you is changes with the seasons.

If you could design a creature to represent the Spring Equinox, what would it look like? What would its favourite food be? Where would it live? What would it feel like? <u>Traditions and customs</u> <u>associated with Spring Equinox.</u>

There are lots of different traditions and customs associated with Spring Equinox, many of which involve eggs. From painting and decorating them then giving them as gifts, to rolling them down hills in



a tradition known as pace egging and not forgetting the traditional egg hunt are all activities which are done at this time. In addition, your own personal Pagan path may include ritual's, meditations and offerings to your Deity or Deities, these are a beautiful way of connecting with your Deity and Mother Earth and are sacred to you.



Inspiration

A ritual is a very sacred time which allows you to connect to your Deity in your own special, unique way. It allows you to be your own wonderful, unique, authentic self and is truly a very special time. 



Lost little hare maze:

Did you know that hare's do not build burrows like rabbits? Instead, they live above ground, and find themselves a safe place to nestle down to sleep. They scrape away at the vegetation and make an imprint which is deeper and wider at the back than the front, this area is called a 'form' and are found in sheltered areas such as long grasses, or between stony, rocky areas which can give them some protection from predators and the elements. Do you know what a young hare is called? They are called leverets, and in this maze the young leveret has become lost! Can you help it find it's way back to the form?


- 2) The special word used when the day and night are almost of equal length, beginning with the letter E


